

PROTOSTAR GROUP DENOUNCES CANCELLATIONS OF RUSSIAN PIANIST'S CONCERTS

SAN DIEGO, CA, March 10, 2022 – The ProtoStar Group denounces the decisions by the Vancouver Recital Society and Orchestre Symphonique de Montréal (OSM) to cancel Alexander Malofeev's concerts simply because he is Russian and did not "speak out publicly against the war" in Ukraine. As much as the world is horrified and repulsed by what Vladimir Putin is doing to Ukraine, pressuring an artist to take a political stance sets a dangerous precedent. In fact, Mr. Malofeev is wise not to speak out against the war given Russia's newly-enacted ambiguous law punishing anyone within its jurisdiction who criticizes the war with 15 years in prison.

Nor does Mr. Malofeev have any personal connections to Mr. Putin, according to his agency in the U.S. Unlike the sanctions and embargoes, cancelling Mr. Malofeev's concert would have absolutely no effect on the Russian economy, the oligarchs, or Mr. Putin himself. The supposed justification by Vancouver Recital Society's founder and artistic director, Leila Getz, that she did not want people protesting Mr. Malofeev or "misbehaving inside the concert hall" seems rather condescending, as it assumes that the classical music audience does not know the difference between the brutal acts of an authoritarian regime and the artistic performance of a musician who did not say anything in support of those acts. Rather, the inescapable conclusion appears to be that the cancellations discriminated against an artist based solely on his national origin – something that is contrary to our democratic values.

Indeed, the arts could play an important role in comforting, inspiring, elevating, and transforming us, especially during these difficult times. President John F. Kennedy once said, "If art is to nourish the roots of our culture, society must set the artist free to follow his vision wherever it takes him. We must never forget that art is not a form of propaganda; it is a form of truth."¹

Music can also bridge divides. During another era when tensions between the U.S. and the then Soviet Union were also high, Vladimir Horowitz, who was from Kyiv, returned to perform at the Moscow Conservatory (where Mr. Malofeev is now studying) after a self-imposed 60-year exile as "an ambassador of peace." For his encore, Mr. Horowitz had carefully chosen "Träumerei" from Schumann's *Scenes from Childhood*. Watching from thousands of miles away, syndicated columnist Andy Rooney wrote:

Almost at the same instant I felt the suggestion of tears in my eyes, the television camera left Horowitz's fingers on the keyboard and dissolved to the face of a Soviet citizen in the audience. He did not

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look like the enemy. His eyes were closed, his head tilted slightly backward so that his face was up ... and one lone teardrop ran down his cheek. It was the same teardrop running down mine.²
